Week of Compassion

This February we once again receive an offering for our shared response to disaster, refugee resettlement and development ministry.

The theme "Rise up Anew" reminds us of the resilience of people when we work together at common purpose to share compassion around the globe.

This year grants were received in our regional church to assist with people in southern Oregon still recovering from deadly wildfires and for the project led by Pacific Islands Family Church to deliver needed goods to the Chuuk Islands where the people are feeling the effects of rising sea water around the island, making it difficult to cultivate sufficient food.

Last year congregations and individuals in our regional church gave \$90,314 to the offering and an additional \$1,058,516 to designated projects such as wildfire rebuilding, Ukrainian aide to displaced persons and storm damage around the world, for a total of \$1,148,830.

By now you have heard...

Unexpected joys have come to me many times in visiting churches in different countries through Global Ministries. I remember being the one who kept the bus waiting as I stayed for one more conversation with brothers and sisters in Christ whose language I could not speak well or at all. In Ha Sekepe, Lesotho, I lingered after a thousand people dispersed from the *moketi*, a great feast celebrating the dedication of a new church building. In Congo, I lingered



using my faded high school French, listening to the woman who showed me the homes where the Fleshmans had lived as mission partners from Oregon. After a long double wedding ceremony in northern Ecuador, I'd had my fill of food but not of the people who welcomed us so graciously. At one Disciples church in rural Mexico, I wanted another chip load of the freshest guacamole ever, as our sons waited by the bus playing hacky-sack. You've seen the type, always the last one to leave the church after coffee hour.

Even after twenty-two years as Co-Regional Ministers, Cathy and I have some of these same feelings after announcing our retirement. Countless moments of fullness and glimpses of joy have come to us in dozens of places and hundreds of ways. We know that more good things await the Disciples of Oregon and Southwest Idaho in the years to come. So with much gratitude and many mixed feelings, we have decided to retire as Regional Ministers on June 30, 2023.

Many times people have said, "I wouldn't want your job for anything." Cathy says "that means more job security for us." For us, since 2001 in Oregon and since 2014 in the new Southwest Idaho and Oregon region, we haven't wanted any other jobs. As Cathy said to the Regional Board, for us this is an opportunity of a lifetime. If we were going to complete a forty-first year of active, ordained ministry, we would hope to do so as Regional Ministers in the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in Oregon and Southwest Idaho.

Ecclesiastes 3:11 says that God makes everything beautiful in its time. Verse 13 says that taking pleasure in one's toil is a gift from God. The people, the ministries, the places of the Oregon and Southwest Idaho Disciples are beautiful in unique ways. Spending time as partners in mission with you, with general church, ecumenical and global partners has come to us as a series of gifts from God. Just one blessed thing after another, you might say. Each one of our members, the pastors and congregations, each Sunday and each year together, a beautiful gift from God. And now it's time to say that it's time.

Thank you for your support of regional church ministries through Disciples Mission Fund, the Christmas offering, the Annual Fund, Pastor's Emergency Fund, camp scholarships, women's ministries, endowments and bequests, and of course to your local congregations. Regional Disciples Women launch grant program

On January 28 over 50 Disciples women gathered on line from all of our 5 districts to participate in a conversation grounded in the study of scripture and the testimony of first hand witness.

The theme of "Remember Me" was given voice by Rev. Dr. Sharon Watkins, former General Minister and President of Disciple of Christ movement, with a Biblical study of stories found in Genesis and Judges about women who experienced abuse and trauma within the community. Mikah Neff, member of Lynchwood Christian Church and staff of Raphael House/domestic violence survivors outreach, brought the real life stories of women escaping abusive situations and the workers who create safe/transforming space for them to regain control in their lives and healing. Regional Minister, Cathy Myers Wirt, reminded those

> gathered of the work their Disciples Women sisters before them had done to meet these needs and enter life with women both inside and outside of our congregations.

> An offering was received, and is still open until February 15, of over \$1,000 to form the foundation of a grant fund for congregations to be present to the needs of the domestic shelters in their own communities. A matching fund will raise this to \$4,000. Grant proposals will be received in March and be dispersed by June, with stories told online.
